


There are many ways to coax our cat





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## Three, Five and Seven The significance of numbers

Three, five and seven. Significant prime numbers. Masonic numbers. Numbers with meanings. These three numbers are interwoven in our Degrees and lectures. Here are a few familiar examples: there are three Degrees in Masonry, five senses and seven liberal arts and sciences. Three, five or seven Masons compose a Lodge to open on a specific Degree. There are three lesser lights. Three stations in the Lodge. Three knocks to open the door. A winding stairway with three, five and seven steps. There is not enough time and space to name them all but you get the point. Have you ever wondered why these numbers? I do not contemplate numbers very often. However, I do love history and find it fascinating. When history and numbers intermingle, I get a little interested. Do you? Why is this relationship significant? Let's see if we can find some answers.

Ancient Craft Masonry traces its beginnings to the building of King Solomon's temple. We know its construction occurred in biblical times. Numbers in the ancient world had significant meanings attached to them. The following "biblical numbers and their meanings" I have found to be accurate, but by no means are they the only meaning of each number.

Starting with the number one, it is associated with unity or new beginnings. The number two can mean either union or division. The number four signifies creation or the world. The number six is defined as weakness of man, the manifestation of sin or evils of Satan. From the meanings of these words, you can see that if our integral Masonic numbers were two, four and six, what the inference might be. Divisive, worldly, weak or worse yet satanic. Though we have often been accused of the latter, the very numbers we hold sacred indicate our Fraternity is nothing of the kind, in fact quite the opposite.

Let's go back to the number three. It is used more in Masonic Ritual than any other number; it denotes divine completeness (deity) or perfection. Grace or God's Goodness is represented by the number five and the seven represents resurrection or spiritual completeness. From a biblical, numerical standpoint, our Masonic numbers represent divine perfection, grace and resurrection. Three, five and seven. The three numbers that pervade Masonic Ritual and Degrees could not be more perfect. Do you believe that these three numbers were selected at random or by chance? You can make your own inferences to the three Degrees, the numbers contained therein and their associations, but I propose that these were chosen purposely and deliberately. Our ancient Brethren were cognizant of biblical numbers and their meanings and they believed in them. Significant biblical numbers in ancient times


**Lodge Competition:** Lodges may compete by demonstrating their proficiency in opening and closing on the Master Mason Degree. The Lodge's team must wholly consist of members of that Lodge. It is not required that the team members be current Lodge officers.

**Individual Competitions:** There will be three categories and individuals may compete by exemplifying the Apron Lecture, the "G" Lecture, or the obligation of the Master Mason Degree.

If you wish to compete, contact your District Deputy as soon as possible. After winners are determined at the district level, there will be competitions in each of the five regions (Northwest, Metro East, Willamette Valley, Southwest and Central/Eastern). Regional winners will meet at the 167th Annual Communication on May 31 in Bend, Ore. to compete for the overall winner in each category.

The Grand Lodge is also generously donating \$1,000 to the Masonic charity of choice for each winner in the above mentioned competitions.

Part of the session involved a discussion about the Six Steps to Initiation Program developed by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia and Yukon and adopted by the Grand Lodge of Washington. We also discussed the role of background checks for petitioners and how this is handled by several jurisdictions in attendance. Other session topics included developing Lodge leaders, the business of the Fraternity and moving our charities beyond traditional brick and mortar facilities.

On Friday, the Western Conference of Grand Masters held their annual meeting. The Western Conference, made up of the Grand Lodges of Alaska, Arizona, British Columbia and Yukon, California, Hawaii, Oregon and Washington, is a more informal gathering of the elected officers of these jurisdictions. At this conference, each jurisdiction does a presentation on a topic of interest to them. Oregon's presentation, given by R.W.B. Ron Eggers, Junior Grand Warden was *Marketing Ourselves to the Craft* and discussed ways the Grand Lodge can become more engaged with its constituent Lodges. This year, M.W. Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of California Inc. was admitted as a member of the Western Conference. We look forward to their participation in future conferences.

It was indeed an honor and privilege for each of us to attend and represent the Grand Lodge of Oregon at these conferences. We feel as though we learned things that can help grow Freemasonry in Oregon and improve the way we operate and manage your Grand Lodge.



Masons back to the Lodge. I encourage you to call or visit them. Invite them to a dinner at the Lodge. Encourage them to get involved by helping with a Child ID booth. Ask them to come to a Lodge meeting or to take part in a Degree or to join a committee. If they are not yet Master Masons, assign them a dedicated mentor and coach who will encourage them. In other words, connect with them and make them feel like they are part of the family. If you care for them, you may find they will be willing to become more involved.

I was once a cat Mason. My work kept me away from the Lodge experience for many years. Once my work life slowed down, I was able to dedicate the time required for Masonry. I became a Lodge officer, joined the Rainbow Board, learned the Ritual and eventually became Master of my Lodge. I couldn't have done this if I was not coaxed and nurtured by my mentor and friends.





## Cascade Lodge No. 208




### 69th Annual Easter Breakfast & Fundraiser
