Why did you become a Mason? This is a question I have been asking myself and others lately. When I think back to when I decided to join the fraternity, several reasons led me to take that initial step. My dad was a Mason as were most of the men I knew growing up. Many of them were business people in Rainier and later in Clatskanie, and they all seemed to be the type of person I wanted to be.

I have had Brothers tell me they joined because they wanted the brotherhood they knew in the service. Others join for the historical and esoteric sides of Freemasonry, having a desire to learn more about it and an opportunity to share their knowledge with others. Some join because they want to become a member of the Scottish or York Rite, while others want to be Shrine Masons.

These are great reasons to join, but I think there is something else in us that leads men to ask to join Freemasonry. I do not know that I can put into words just what it is. Perhaps it is a desire to belong to something greater than ourselves, something that we know is the right thing to do but cannot put into words. If we can look deep within and examine the reasons we asked for that petition and remember where we were first made a Mason, I think we begin to see why only some men take that giant step to ask a friend for a petition.





How often do we share what Masonry means to us? I find being able to talk and share a personal experience builds a stronger connection and provides a better insight into what Masonry is all about.

For me, it all started with my grandfather, Kenneth Miles, who provided me with a source of stability at a young age when young men can often struggle in what path they may take in life. My father was not a Mason, and I knew nothing of Masonry. It was in high school that my grandfather


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The Robert M. Richmond Library and Museum



LIBRARY AND MUSEUM RENDERING

April 12 will mark the dedication of the new library/museum at the Grand Lodge campus in Forest Grove. This is the first new structure to be built in 20 years since the completion of the Grand Lodge office and Jennings McCall Center II in 1999.

When the library and museum project was proposed to the Trustees, two options to accomplish the desired result were studied at length. Option one: Remodel and add on to the existing Grand Lodge office building. Option two:

Build a new structure. To remodel the existing building was much more expensive than new construction. Due to this, construction of a new 5,000 square foot building began in the spring of 2018 and is in the final stages of completion. The structure will be a combined library/museum and is designed to hold several thousand books and provide the opportunity to display artifacts unique to the history of Freemasonry in Oregon.

The building is nestled in the oak trees just north of the Grand Lodge office. With permission from Multnomah Lodge No. 1, their trunk, that held the original charter from Missouri and came to the Oregon Territory by wagon, will be on display in the museum. It may be one of the most unique artifacts in Oregon Freemasonry.

In addition to the books currently housed at the Grand Lodge, more than 2,400 books were donated from the private collection of M.W.B. Bob Richmond who laid down his working tools in the fall of 2014. These have been cataloged and coded in preparation for display. M.W.B. Bob had a personal library of more than 4,000 books and was transporting 8,000 books from Sheridan, Mont. to Baker City when he had a fatal heart attack in Dillion, Mont. The idea of making the new library a memorial library dedicated to M.W.B. Bob was discussed with Mrs. Joyce Richmond, widow of M.W.B. Bob, and their children, Robyn, Jeff, and Verlyn. The family





introduced me to DeMolay, which immediately sparked an interest in me. This opened my eyes to the world of Masonry. I asked my grandfather to join the year I became eligible; the challenge was that I was going to college at the Oregon Institute of Technology (OIT) in Klamath Falls.

My Masonic journey started on December 18, 1985, while I was home during Christmas break. It was an honor to have my grandfather confer the EA degree.

I remember that short winter break from my college studies as I spent just about every day with my grandfather learning the EA lecture. At the time, I did not realize what a blessing that was. The hours spent flew by as I heard many a story about family and also learned a lot about Masonry. The hard work paid off, and I was able to go through the FC degree on January 4, 1986, before going back to OIT.

The plan was to learn my FC proficiency when I went home for spring break. We had scheduled the MM degree at the same time – no pressure! Those three months at OIT flew by as I was focusing on graduating with my engineering degree. When I returned home during spring break, the first stop was to visit my grandfather and get to work on learning my part. Sadly to say, my head was filled with engineering formulas, and I quickly discovered that I would have to double my efforts if I was going to be ready for the MM degree in just a few short days. Again, the hours flew by as I learned more of the symbolism of Masonry, and of course, more family stories. I was raised a MM on March 29, 1986. My grandfather conferred all three degrees and more importantly was my coach and mentor.

I often think back and reflect on the many hours spent with my grandfather. If I had not made the choice to become a Mason, I would have missed the opportunity to really get to know my grandfather and the strong positive influence that exists today. He instilled in me to work hard, go after my dreams, and have a strong moral compass.

The Fellow of the Craft Mentor Training




Some of the Brethren who received mentor training for the Fellow of the Craft program on Jan. 26.

The Widows Sons of Oregon



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Mason of the Month – The Editor

In 1990, Lyon Lodge No. 29 started a joint newsletter with Jennings No. 9 and Rickreall No. 110 as well as Eastern Star Chapters Naomi No. 22 and Adah No. 34. After two years, W.B. Howard Haynes was asked to take over as editor and for the past 26 years, W.B. Haynes has published and edited our monthly newsletter.

After creating the newsletter, W.B. Haynes would print over 200 copies, then he and his wife would mail them to Lodge members as far away as Florida. Over the years, email became popular, and so W.B. Haynes also sent out an electronic version of the newsletter to over 100 additional members who requested it in that format. In doing so, he reached more members in places as far away as Canada, the Cook Islands, and the Philippines.

As you know, the outreach to members, near and far, is critical to keeping our members "in the Light". W.B. Haynes took a significant amount of time each month to make sure our Masonic family continued to stay in touch. I've heard from several members, who are not able to attend Lodge due to their location or medical condition, who enjoy keeping in contact with the Lodge even if only through a brief newsletter.

Recently, our Lodge Historian, Scott McArthur, asked W.B. Haynes to print all of the newsletters from the last 26 years (about 300 newsletters) and bind them for future historians to use, and W.B. Haynes agreed to do that. I feel that his sacrifice and commitment, not only to our Lodge but also to the other nearby Masonic organizations, have gone well above and beyond any expectations, and this is why I strongly believe he is worthy of Mason of the Month.
