The growth and expansion of the Charges is made possible by the attendees and their evaluation forms given after each training, thank you. I must not forget to thank the staff at the Jennings McCall Center for their assistance in keeping the attendees fully charged with food.

This year I have traveled to over 45 Lodges. One observation I have made during my visitations is that Lodges can improve their com-

munications. Communication with their members, communities, Lodges in their District, and the Grand Lodge office.

Communication with their members: A recent comment by a Lodge member after receiving a letter from his Lodge was that this was the first communication from his Lodge in at least 10 years. I think many of us could say the same thing about our own Lodges. After all, why would a Lodge send its members a written communication, when Masons are expected to attend Lodge regularly,

or if they receive the Lodge Trestleboard? Brothers, if you look at your member registry and then look at your Tyler's register for the past few months, you may see the two come nowhere close to comparing.

Due to reasons too numerous to list here, not all members attend Lodge regularly. Your Lodge Trestleboard is a great tool to share news and information with your membership; however, not all Lodges

produce Trestleboards consistently, and few include important Lodge business. Do you know of any Lodges that send Lodge minutes to members that did not attend Lodge? This effort would be above the call of duty but surely keep their members informed.

In an effort to communicate with Lodge members, I might suggest that your Lodge create a Communications Committee. The committee does not need to contact Lodge Brethren monthly, but maybe quarterly, to bring news to the members of the Lodge, or at special occasions such as birthdays or the anniversary of their Raising.

Communication with your community: Does your Lodge list in the local newspaper or community newsletter the times and dates of your Lodge meetings? Keeping your Lodge's name in the public's eye brings awareness that a Masonic Lodge exists in their community.

District communications: Few Lodges in our Jurisdiction have a district-wide Trestleboard. The benefit of communicating with Lodges in your District allows for the membership to know what is happening district-wide. Does your Lodge Trestleboard get mailed to neighboring Lodges? If not, you may find value to do so. Sideliners are a great sign of Lodge health.

Communications with the Grand Lodge office: Communications with the Grand Lodge office is an important relationship that should not be overlooked. I encourage Lodge Officers, especially the Secretary, to take advantage of the Grand Secretary's office when questions or issues arise. Keep in mind this is a business office, try not to wear out your welcome.

Brothers, do not forget to communicate with your members, your community, your District and the Grand Lodge office.




rehab facilities throughout the metro area.

A Visit to New York's Grand Masonic Hall Entered Apprentice Degree

During a family vacation to New York City during spring break, I, W.B. Thomas Pierce, Master of Tigard-Orenomah Lodge No. 207, had the good fortune to attend Mariners Lodge No. 67, F. & A.M.'s, conferral of an Entered Apprentice degree on four worthy candidates. The Lodge meets at New York's elegant Masonic Hall in the Chelsea neighborhood of Manhattan. Approximately 75 Masonic bodies meet in this temple. This is the seat of the Grand Lodge of New York, and the building contains 10 Lodge and four banquet rooms, the Grand Lodge offices, a lounge, and the Chancellor Robert R. Livingston Masonic Library. Free public tours of the building are conducted on weekdays.

Mariners Lodge was consecrated in 1825 and was originally comprised of seafaring men who plied the waters of New York Harbor and beyond. The Lodge maintains some of the flavor of this heritage through the singing of "sea shanties" at their Festive Boards and the ringing of the "Captain's Bell" at the opening of Lodge. During the 1990s, I was a frequent visitor to Mariners when I resided in New York. My own New York Lodge, Franklin No. 195, meets in the same building.

The EA degree conferral was performed on Wednesday, March 28 in the Doric Room. Approximately 45 Masons were in attendance from numerous jurisdictions including New Jersey, Connecticut, Georgia, California, Florida, and of course, Oregon! It was a busy evening, and the degree was long being conferred on four worthy men. The reason for multiple conferrals is because there is a long list of men waiting to be initiated, passed, and raised in Mariners, a nearly two-year wait! One of the highlights of the degree was the "Lecture of Reasons" which explains the various parts of the EA degree to the newly initiated Brothers. Mariners is an active Lodge, busy educating its members, and performing charitable work in the community and beyond. During the Lodge meeting, reports on Lodge sponsored projects in Puerto Rico, Cuba, and India were made! Brothers, if you are in New York, I strongly recommend a visit to Mariners Lodge.

Oregon, we must continually update our facilities to keep it attractive for our current and future residents. Over the past few years, we have expanded our Memory Care facility and upgraded several apartments to keep our Home

current with industry expectations, and more updates are on the way.

This Masonic year, the main entrance to the Independent Living side of our Home was updated with a new portico and lobby area which includes a fireplace, new furniture, and modern lighting. The original library area has been upgraded and converted into a single-story room with additional floor space above. The stairways have also been enclosed with fire doors to meet the newer safety requirements.

Several phases remain in the remodel including an upgrade to the dining rooms for the Assisted Living and Independent Living residents and modernizing the kitchen with a new floor, appliances, and more. We will also be upgrading all hallways and remaining resident rooms as they become available. Once completed, our Masonic Home will continue to be a showcase for those desiring to live in a high-quality retirement facility.

Although the Jennings McCall Center continues to be a wonderful place to live, not all Masons or Eastern Star ladies want to move to Forest Grove. The Masonic and Eastern Star Home Board realized this some time ago. Under the MESHCare program, qualified applicants can live in an approved retirement home of their choice, allowing them to stay close to the people and places they know and love.
